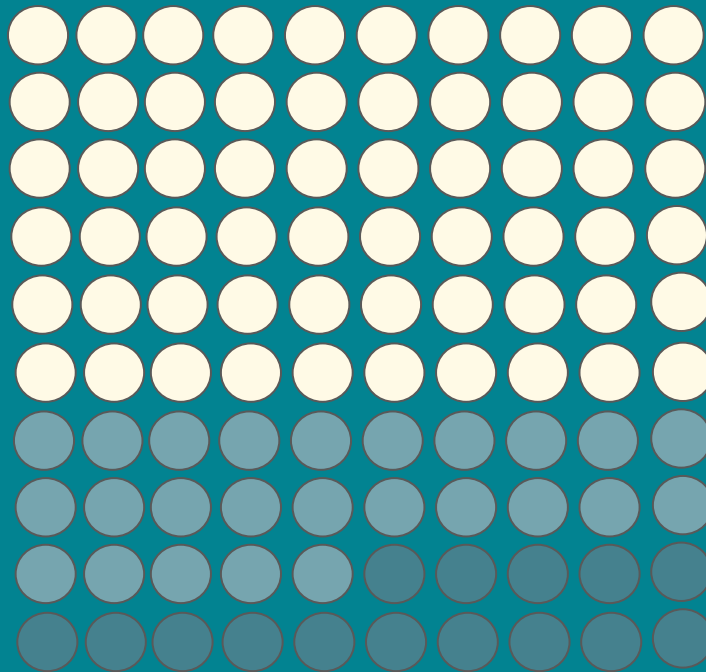

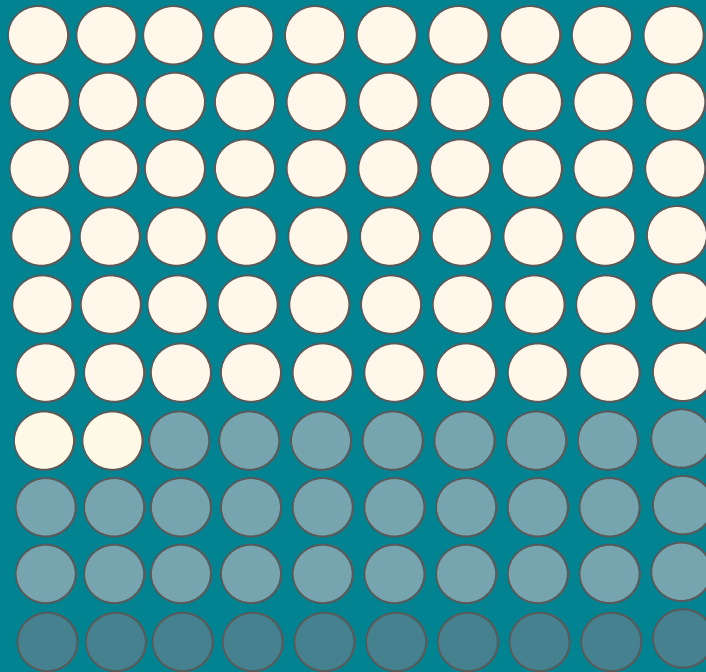

Empathise: the transition must be fair



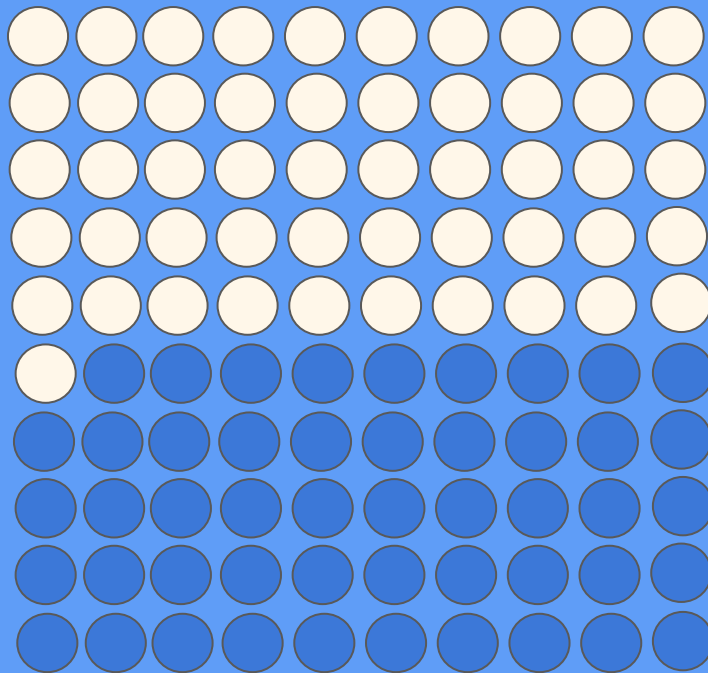
People think net zero will be good for the UK as a whole. But people on lower incomes especially worry that they will be left to face the costs of transition.

“ So that means me having to buy a whole new car that I probably can't afford anyway, just to be able to drive to a place of work and your wages are not going up either... I find it very frustrating.

Do this

Most people care about climate and nature. Voters want to see action from politicians.



Don't do this

We can't let the climate delayers and deniers make climate change a culture war issue.

Why?

Most people care and want action. Denial and delay are fringe views. Don't give them air they don't deserve.

Show climate action is... joined up



Do this

Climate action can help with the cost of living. And clean energy is better for bills than expensive oil and gas.



Don't do this

The cost of living crisis is nothing compared to what we're facing with the climate crisis. Without urgent, radical action, we'll be living through crisis after crisis and our children will have no future.

Why?

Don't pit climate change against other issues, or say things that feel like a threat. Instead, show how climate action helps with the other issues that are affecting us right now. It's part of all our stories - from housing to health.

Do this

The next government can show the world how to tackle the cost of living crisis and climate crisis at the same time. With our huge potential for wind, wave and solar power, we can be leaders in clean energy.



Don't do this

We need the next government to be radical, and show that they're prepared to put climate change ahead of all other issues no matter what.

Why?

People want and need to feel that our country can get things done. Most don't support 'radical' approaches - they want to feel that things will be thought through and well managed.

Do this

Tackling climate change and protecting nature go hand in hand.



Don't do this

Biodiversity and nature loss is just as important as climate change, we're not hearing and talking enough about that this election.

Why?

Don't pit issues against each other, especially ones that most people strongly connect.

Show climate action is... possible



Do

Voters want climate leadership from whichever party wins the election.



Don't do this

All politicians have let us down with their failure to put climate and nature first - and whoever wins the election will continue to disappoint.

Why?

The idea that all leaders are the same feeds fatalism and inaction.
